BOATING FACILITIES REPORT

Another year has passed, and we are pleased to report that there is continued interest in Class sailing dinghies and Power Boats by our membership. It is great to see the Club alive with all the activity taking place in the boating area, dinghies being prepared for racing and Power Boats for a day down the coast with family and friends.

In the 2016 Boating Facilities Report, we outlined the situation at the time and a target approach to improve the facilities and usage going forward. There were 2 key issues that required attention:

- 1. Lack of space compounded by the use of boating facilities without regard to the rules and regulations
- 2. Staff-Member conflicts

Space is still an issue at the Club. We continue to have many inactive boats on the Club's premises. Perhaps, the soon-to-be-introduced new fee structure may encourage Members to find alternative storage.

Regarding the 2nd issue, there has been an overall improvement in the working relationship between the Boating staff and the Members and vice versa.

We would like to apologize to the Kayak and Paddle Board users for the inconvenience they have been experiencing with the racks being temporarily moved to the area behind the staff quarters. We are actively looking to find a more suitable location and to have the racks covered.

As part of our plan to improve storage facilities, the registration and auditing of items being stored on the Club's premises has started. We have been faced with some challenges, but these are being worked through and the necessary corrective actions are being taken. Accurate record-keeping will also facilitate monthly auditing, ensuring that Members are being charged correctly.

To help us keep this database up-to-date, members are reminded that:

- a Registration Form must be filled out and approved by Management before members are permitted to bring and store their boats, kayaks, paddle boards, canoes etc. on the Club's premises.
- the Office must be notified when items are being removed from the premises and when items are being returned.

We would like to remind everyone that there is a Suggestion/Complaints book in the office specifically for the Boating and House and Grounds areas. We wish to hear from you with your concerns and suggestions so that we can improve and work towards having a club where everyone's ideas are considered.

Finally, we would like to thank all the BYC Staff for their care and hard work; their willingness to help and for keeping the boating areas clean and tidy. Thanks also to Mr. Gonsalves and his boating team of Rawle, Kenrick, Kenneth and young Kenneth for the great job they do in assisting our boating membership with the launching and hauling out of the boats, kayaks, paddle boats and other items, and to the boating sub-committee members Mr. Alan Hodgkinson, Mr. Damien Brooker and Mr. Darren White for their valuable contributions and support during the year.

Let us continue on our path to raising the bar and working towards making the BYC the number one Yacht Club in the region.



ENTERTAINMENT REPORT

2016 ended with the annual Old Year's Night party. Dinner was once again served in the Ballroom and received very favourable reviews. Following the success of the previous year, Brass Soul returned to provide the entertainment on the beach along with a DJ. Attendance was lower than anticipated, but the Club had taken note of the challenges faced the previous year and stepped up the level of service significantly to provide a most enjoyable evening for all who attended.

The Children's Christmas party was another hit. Once again there were live characters to entertain the children and this was a resounding success along with tattoos, treasure hunts, rides, cotton candy and more. Of course the highlight was the arrival of Santa who delivered gifts to the delight of all.

The Last Friday Night parties continued to be well attended. Along with some of the regular performers, three new DJ's were introduced during the year as well as new live performances, in an effort to provide the variety needed to satisfy the diverse membership of the Club.

The Club hosted two large international sailing regattas during the year and provided entertainment on a daily basis for both the visiting sailors and the Club's members, who joined in to enjoy the festivities. The Combermere steel orchestra, Sink The Dinghy Party and Pig Roast Beach Party were particularly popular.

The Club teamed up with Emile Straker and friends to hold a fundraising event for the Dominican Hurricane relief effort. It was well attended, the dance floor was lively and we are happy to report that as a result of the donations received we were able to make a significant contribution, purchasing supplies and building materials. Thank you to the musicians and all who donated.

Efforts are continuing to improve the communication between the Club and its members so that everyone is kept abreast of the Club's activities. Facebook has been a wonderful tool and we hope to further develop the opportunities provided by social media.

Members are always encouraged to make suggestions either verbally, in writing or on the club's Facebook page. The Club is keen to improve, diversify and try new ideas (or maybe revive some old favourites you used to enjoy) - your feedback is crucial, so be sure to let us know your thoughts.

I would like to thank the Yacht Club staff who have worked tirelessly to make all the events possible over the past months and also the entertainment sub-committee members for their support throughout the year.





FOOD AND BEVERAGE REPORT

The Food and Beverage Committee composed of Paul Johnson (chairman), Chris Skinner, Alex McKenzie and Dick Stoute continue to oversee the F&B operation of the club.

Again this year, the committee was engaged in recruiting a Food & Beverage Manager, as we found it necessary to release the person we had hired late last year. Luckily we had a couple of good candidates on file and Miss Nicole Rudder started work mid-December 2016.

With Nicole Rudder on board we were able to tighten controls of our buffet



and beach restaurant, however, the cost of sales only reflects a marginal decrease, (only 2%), as the cost of food unfortunately increased through the year (including our beloved Flying fish that now wholesales for a whopping \$2.50 each). We are hoping that we will be able to reduce food costs even further as we are in the process of installing a system for inventory control that is tied to the cash register. The F&B committee welcomes Mr Steven Scott, our new Club Manager, who will be instrumental, along with Miss Rudder, in getting this system up.

During the year we were also able to set up a system to calculate cost prices for the items being sold on the Beach Restaurant Menu and we have adjusted menu prices to reflect these costs. A notable decrease was achieved in some items, but others had to be increased. Going forward our next step will be to provide an enhanced menu and we hope that the members will provide some ideas of dishes that they would like to see on the menu. We are also hopeful that we will get the Panini (grilled sandwich) maker installed, as well as some other changes that will see a much faster turn around in the kitchen.

The Financials show that the F&B department lost \$117,398 this year. The loss was mainly due to an overall reduction of \$130,974 in Food and Beverage income resulting from a significant decrease in Banquets, (Down by \$103,082), as well as a drop in Restaurant sales (down by \$58,553). These were partially offset by an increase in Bar Sales of \$30,641, but this was not sufficient to offset the other losses. Another contributing factor to this loss was an increase in indirect expenses of \$36,996 some 12.6% above the previous year, driven mainly be an increase in Laundry and Linen and Equipment costs, of approximately \$30,000.

Direct labour costs dropped by approximately \$15,000 but our cost of salaries and wages continue to be high when compared to the income. The cost of F&B salaries and wages is 89.7% of the Gross Profit (Gross Profit is \$956,843 and cost of salaries and wages is \$857,891). The combination of our high food and high labour costs almost guarantees a loss.

FOOD AND BEVERAGE REPORT (Cont'd)

However, in our opinion we are now in a position to make several improvements that will increase throughput and reduce costs. We felt that it was important to ensure that our pricing is competitive. The restaurant trade usually sets selling prices so that food costs are less than 30% of the (pre VAT) selling price. To keep our prices competitive we have targeted a 40% food cost and expect that our prices will be lower than what would be obtained outside the club.

From an overall perspective, this year has also been a difficult period for the Food and Beverage Department. Cost and control remain the main issues. Although there seems to be improvements in morale, much work still has to be done. We have to upgrade our menus, reduce costs, and improve controls and service levels. We have plans in place to achieve this. We will also continue to work on ways to improve the bar service on those busy evenings like "last Friday Night" and we must find ways to get dishes out of the kitchen faster. Above all, we have to offer meals at a quality and price that will encourage members to come to the club more often and we must see to it that our members are happy and satisfied with the offerings. We hope to have an improved menu by Christmas Holidays. It will be nice to have hot grilled savory and sweet sandwiches soon.

We extend our thanks to the Club's staff, members of the F & B committee, and to the many active members who have supported this operation and offered suggestions for improvements. We look forward to your continued support for the upcoming year as various initiatives are implemented to continue to improve the level of service provided.



HOUSE AND GROUNDS REPORT

The year 2017 was busy in the House and Grounds department. However, we were able to execute maintenance and repairs to some of the areas of the Club, which were as follows:

- Installation of CCTV cameras.
- Replacement of and adding lighting, to improve the ambiance of the club.
- Installation of music system on the Beach.
- Sprucing up the beach bathroom facilities.
- Maintenance to the shingled roofs of the beach facility.
- Re-varnishing the ballroom floor.
- Replacement of timber over the gutters on the southern side of the main building.
- Repairs to the cracked beam on the western side of the main building.
- Repairing the rotten wooden beam on the southern side of the ballroom.
- Supporting some trees on the beach with a concrete structure.
- The area adjacent to the tennis courts was grassed & benches were placed for members to view tennis.
- Removing mildew from the main tent.
- Repainting the beach facilities.
- Refurbishing of pumps including purchasing one for backup for the sewage lift stations.
- Installing one pump for washing boats.
- Retiling the outdoor shower.
- Concreting the rear entrance to the kitchen.

HOUSE AND GROUNDS REPORT (Cont'd)

The Barbados Yacht Club is a beautiful property and as we look ahead to 2018, we would like to accomplish the following:

- Replacing roofs on two small buildings (the visitors' washrooms and old locker building).
- Replacing linoleum with vinyl plank flooring in the corridor outside of the office.
- Installing a pump under the Gym building for irrigation.
- Construction of roofs on two containers.
- Repairing the north wall in the upstairs gents washroom of the clubhouse.

As we continue to work together as members, let us all contribute to maintaining our lovely Club. We must extend thanks to the Barbados Yacht Club and Maintenance staff who worked tirelessly throughout the year to maintain the property in good condition.

YACHTING REPORT

The Sailing Sub-Committee began planning the 2017 Sailing Calendar in September, 2016. After the difficult task of trying to fit the many varied regattas, including two World Championships, into what appeared to be too few weekends, the 2017 Calendar was finally published in late October, and we were happy to welcome three new sponsors; **Armstrong Agencies, Golden Ridge Farms and Stansfeld Scott**.

The sailing season then got underway in mid-January with the **Taylor's Cycle Centre** sponsored J/24 Regatta. This was followed by the **Mount Gay Rum Round Barbados Race Series** organised by the Barbados Cruising Club. The **Yacht Club Series** then continued with J/24, Offshore and Dinghy Regattas being held on Sundays throughout the season from the end of January to early July, thanks to the generous sponsorship from **Taylor's Cycle Centre**, **Massy Stores** and our three new sponsors.

In late May, the Barbados Yacht Club hosted the **OK Dinghy World Championships** and these were followed in early June by the **Finn Masters World Championships**. The Club welcomed a total of 80 OK Dinghy sailors from 9 different countries and 130 Finn sailors from 21 different countries to the two events. Sailing in late May and early June, the sailors were presented with some challenging sailing conditions typical of that time of the year. The higher than normal sea swells and stronger than normal winds on some of the days made for some very interesting races, with even the most experienced sailors being kept on their toes until the very end. With phrases such as "just perfect", "fantastic", "amazing", "we want to come back" being constantly heard, the local Organising Committee made up of members of the Barbados Sailing Association, the large number of volunteers both on and off the water, and members of the Yacht Club staff must be congratulated for making the events so successful.





Other major regattas held during the year included the popular **Lucky Horseshoe Regatta** in early April, the **Barbados Old Brigand Rum Regatta**, organised by the Barbados Sailing Association, in early May, and the much anticipated **Harris Paints Regatta** in early July.

The J/24 Club also organised several regattas through the season including the **Tiki Bar Regatta**, the **Boatyard Regatta** and the **J/24 Open Championships**. As always, the windward-leeward courses sailed

along the South Coast in the Tiki Bar Regatta and the J/24 Open proved to be popular with spectators on the boardwalk and brought sailing into the public domain.

The **National Dinghy Championships**, organised by the Barbados Sailing Association, were sailed on Sundays from September to November in Carlisle Bay, and in mid November many of our dinghy sailors competed in the **Barbados International Invitational** or **BiiG Games** organised by the Barbados Olympic Association.

Several local yachts also participated in overseas regattas again this year. In late January, three boats took part in the **2017 Grenada Sailing Week**. Shangri La took top honours in the Cruising Class, Whistler placed second in CSA Racing Class, and Shakin placed third in Racer/Cruiser Class 1. Whistler then went on to take third place in CSA 5 in the 37th St Maarten Heineken **Regatta** in early March. Easter then saw three Barbados boats taking part in the **Bequia Easter Regatta**; Sail La Vie was victorious in the Cruising Class with Shangri La placing fourth in the same class, and Shakin placing fourth in the J/24 Class. In late April, Conviction took first place in CSA 3 in the 50th Antigua Sailing Week.

A few of our young sailors have also been competing in sailing events overseas, including Scott Gittens who represented Barbados in the Laser North American Championships in Vancouver, and the Laser Canadian Championships and the CORK Olympic Classes Regatta in Kingston, Ontario.





At the time of writing, nominations for the **Alan Taylor Memorial Trophy** have not yet closed for 2017, however, the Barbados Sailing Association's President and keen sailor, Gus Reader, was awarded the Trophy in 2016 for his contributions to sailing.

In May, the Club engaged the services of Ché Alleyne to run its **Sailing Academy** which began operations in early July, offering two week long sailing camps over the summer holiday period. Whilst the number of students taking part in the camps was relatively low, everyone thoroughly enjoyed themselves and certainly learnt a lot from Ché who proved to be a definite 'hit' with the kids.

Finally, we would like to thank all our various sponsors, Taylor's Cycle Centre, Armstrong Agencies, Golden Ridge Farms, Stansfeld Scott, Massy Stores, Lucky Horseshoe and Harris Paints for their continued support this year.

Special thanks also go out to the BYC office, bar and kitchen staff, and to Mr. Gonsalves and his team of boatmen; Rawle Sealy, Kenrick Sealy, Kenneth Gittens and Kenneth St Hill for all their help and support during the year. I should also like to personally thank Peter Burke for his help in so many ways.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT To the Members of the Barbados Yacht Club

Qualified opinion

We have audited the financial statements of the Barbados Yacht Club (the Club), which comprise the balance sheet as of 30 September, 2017 and the statements of changes in members' funds, income and expenditure and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the failure to record the defined benefit pension plan asset or liability and any related cost, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Club as of 30 September, 2017 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards for Small and Medium-Sized Entities (IFRS for SMEs).

Basis for qualified opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Club in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Barbados, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

As disclosed in Note 2(c) to the financial statements, the Club does not comply with the provisions of IFRS for SMEs Section 28 with respect to employees' benefits. The effects on the financial statements of the failure to record and disclose the requirements under IFRS for SMEs Section 28: Employee Benefits have not been determined.

Responsibilities of management and those charged with governance for the financial statements.

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with IFRS for SMEs, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Club's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Club or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Club's financial reporting process.

1. STATUS AND PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The status of the organisation is that of a club. Upon winding up or dissolution the proceeds shall be divided equally among all Full Members and Honorary Life Members.

The Club's activities are the promotion of yachting, lawn tennis and other social amenities.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards for Small and Medium-Sized Entities (IFRS for SMEs) applicable in Barbados except as stated below.

(b) Estimates

Preparation of financial statements in conformity with IFRS for SMEs requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported revenues and expenses during the period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

(c) Pension plan

The Club operates a defined benefit pension plan. The plan is funded by payments from the Club taking account of the recommendations of an independent qualified actuary.

Under Section 28 of IFRS for SMEs, pension accounting costs are assessed using the projected unit credit method. Under this method, the cost of providing pensions is charged to the income statement so as to spread the regular cost over the service lives of employees in accordance with the advice of an independent qualified actuary, who carries out a full valuation of the plan every three years. The pension obligation is measured as the present value of the estimated future cash outflows using interest rates of long term government securities.

At the balance sheet date, the Club has not complied with the above policy and, to this extent, it does not comply with Section 28: Employee Benefits.

(d) Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is the amount at which the inventories can be realised in the normal course of operations.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH SEPTEMBER 2017

(Expressed in Barbados Dollars)

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(e) Property, plant and equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Crockery, glassware and items of furniture and equipment with low values are not depreciated, but expensed against income when purchased.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual values over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method. The following annual rates are used for the depreciation of property, plant and equipment:

Buildings – 2.0% Improvements to tennis courts – 10.0% Furniture, equipment and software – 10.0% - 100.0%

If there is an indication that there has been a significant change in depreciation rate, useful life or residual value of an asset, the depreciation of that asset is revised prospectively to reflect the new expectations.

(f) Revenue

Subscriptions are recorded on the accruals basis and all other revenue is recorded when earned.

(g) Foreign currency

The financial statements are expressed in Barbados dollars. Non-monetary assets and liabilities and transactions occurring in foreign currencies are translated into Barbados dollars at the rates of exchange prevailing on the date of each transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in a foreign currency are translated into Barbados dollars at the exchange rates ruling at the date of the balance sheet. Exchange gains and losses arising are recognized in the statement of income.

15. PENSION PLAN

The pension plan is a non-contributory defined benefit plan and subject to a tri-annual actuarial valuation. The last valuation was done on 1 April, 2016 and at that date the unfunded liability of the fund was \$37,484 (2013 - surplus of \$86,523). The Club's required contribution rate is 7.25% of its payroll which will eliminate the unfunded liability over 3 years. Payments made during the year amounted to \$39,585 (2016 – \$40,843).

For the going concern valuation, the actuaries have used the same economic assumptions as those used at the prior valuation, as at 1 April, 2013 as follows:
